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

Koi Pond Concerns

Summer presents a unique set of challenges and considerations for Koi pond owners, especially in places like Colorado with its summers which can be both hot and dry. Things to keep in your mind as we go into the hot month of August and even September include:

Warm weather can significantly elevate pond temperatures, impacting the well-being of Koi. Prolonged exposure to high temperatures (above 85°F) can weaken Koi's immune systems, making them more susceptible to diseases and parasites. Keeping your pond thermometers in easy to access areas for checking water temperature is important, but keep in mind that you never want to create a rapid temperature change. Koi can adapt to slow increases in temperature, but they will not respond well to a sudden change. If water does get too hot—above 85-90 degrees—you can gradually introduce cooler water over the course of a day to bring it down. Additionally, it can be both useful and beautiful to provide shade for the pond using aquatic plants like water lilies or lotus, a shade sail, or strategically planted trees or shrubs.

Oxygen depletion: Hotter water holds less dissolved oxygen, and fish metabolic rates increase, increasing oxygen demand, which can lead to stress and even death for Koi. If you are worried about fish swimming up to the surface to breathe or suddenly spending time by the waterfall, you can increase oxygen levels by adding an air pump and diffuser or installing a pond aerator. There are also test kits that will let you know how much oxygen is in the water.

Water evaporation: Higher temperatures in Colorado can lead to significant water loss due to evaporation, sometimes as much as 1 to 3 inches per week. This necessitates regular monitoring and topping off of the pond with dechlorinated water to maintain proper water levels. Having your pond linked to your sprinkler system can help maintain a consistent water level.

Outside of the pond, there are predators to consider. Warm weather encourages Colorado predators like bears, herons, and raccoons to seek out food sources, making Koi ponds a target. Even neighborhood cats can prove a threat to a Koi! Koi, bred for vibrant colors rather than camouflage, can become easy prey for these animals.

Some general summer recommendations for maintaining Koi health and wellbeing in the hot summer months include good water quality management. Regularly test water parameters (pH, ammonia, nitrite, nitrate) and perform regular partial water changes to maintain optimal water quality. If ammonia or nitrate levels rise, you can do up to a 50% water change with dechlorinated water to reduce toxic levels of those substances. You can also consider feeding your fish less to reduce food sinking to the bottom, decomposing, and contributing to dangerous water conditions.

In general, monitor monitor monitor! Vigilantly observe your Koi for any unusual behavior that may be a sign of stress, illness, or parasite infestation. The sooner you recognize a problem, the easier it will be to treat, address, and resolve the problem!

Do your lilies have lots of leaves, but no blooms?

Although having lots of lily pads is great for providing your Koi security and blocking sunlight, we also want to see those beautiful blossoms. If your water lilies aren't blooming, check for these possible issues.

Nutrient Deficiency: Yellowing or curling leaves and a lack of blooms may indicate your lilies are starved for key nutrients like nitrogen, iron, or magnesium. When was the last time you fed them? A gentle boost may be all they need. Slow-release fertilizer like the Pond Tabs + that we sell as a fundraiser will give them that extra boost for a little over a month and encourage healthy, vibrant growth.

Inadequate Sunlight: Water lilies need a generous six to eight hours of direct or partial sunlight each day. If they're situated under a tree canopy or in a shady corner of the pond, they may appear weak or underdeveloped. Consider relocating them to a brighter spot where they can bask in the sun's energy.

Overcrowding: Like all plants, water lilies require space to expand and thrive. If they're confined to a small planter or competing for room with too many neighbors, growth can become stunted. Gently remove your plant and divide the lilies tubers into individual containers. While this process is best done in the spring, it can be done midsummer.

Imbalanced pH Levels: Water lilies flourish in a pH range of 6.2 to 7.4. Deviations outside this range can disrupt nutrient absorption and overall health. Regularly test your pond's water with a reliable pH Test Kit to ensure your pH stays within a safe range for your plants and fish.

Just like roses in a flower bed, water lilies benefit from consistent care. Prune back any yellowing or browning leaves and spent blooms. This simple maintenance encourages fresh growth, and with it the return of those beautiful blossoms you've been missing.

Water Celery - Variegated

Oenanthe javanica 'Flamingo'

Hardy Marginal Pink/Green/White. Shallow water plant features unusual pink, green and white foliage. Pink is outstanding in spring and fall.

Invasive in natural ponds.

Hardy to Zone 5. Plant 0-1" depth, Full Sun/Full Shade, 6-12" height.

Why Do We Love Our Koi and Water Gardens?

The Joy of Pond Plants: A Symphony of Life

Pond plants are more than visual delights—they are the heartbeat of the aquatic ecosystem. They purify the water by absorbing excess nutrients, helping to prevent algae blooms. Their roots provide shelter for tadpoles, snails, and beneficial insects. Frogs, dragonflies, and birds visit regularly, drawn by the habitat these plants create.

For the gardener, this means more than just an attractive display. It means participation in a living system. There's a special kind of joy in witnessing dragonfly nymphs emerge from the water onto a lily pad, or in spotting a frog camouflaged among reeds. These moments feel like secret gifts from the natural world.

The Joy of Keeping Koi: A Gentle Bond

One of the most unexpected joys of keeping koi is the bond that can develop between fish and keeper. With patience and consistency, koi can learn to recognize their caretakers, coming to the surface at feeding time or even eating gently from your hand. These moments of interaction are small, but powerful—a reminder that connection doesn't always require words or gestures. Sometimes, it's enough to share space, to offer food, and to move in harmony with another living being.



Member Spotlight—Allen and Linda Burbidge
