#### **President's Ponderings**

#### The End of Summer Doldrums for Koi and Pond Keepers

As August fades into September, many of us koi keepers may notice a subtle change in both our ponds and our own enthusiasm. Back in spring, everything was new and exciting—fresh plants were going in or beginning to emerge, and the koi darted to the surface at feeding time. But by mid-September, both we and our fish tend to slow down a bit.



As the days shorten, the water begins to cool down, and the vigor of our plants and the liveliness of our Koi begin to drop. Feeding time can feel less like a splashy frenzy and more like a slow snack. That's normal—it's just their way of adjusting to the season.

On our side, the excitement of spring projects has long passed. We've cleaned the pond, tinkered with the filter, planted, fed, and fussed all summer long. By now, routine chores like cleaning mats or skimming leaves can feel more like work than fun. Some folks even find themselves looking at their pond and thinking, "It's nice...but kind of quiet."

This slowdown is the end of summer doldrums. But the truth is, it can be a very useful time if we make the most of it. Late summer is perfect for just sitting back and watching your koi closely. Which fish are filling out nicely? Which ones have colors that are really shining? Do you see any that might need extra attention, or signs that your pond might be getting a little crowded? Do you have areas where the plants are taking over or areas that need some additional plants? These observations can help guide decisions for fall and next spring.

It's also a good season for light pond housekeeping. Trim back plants that have gone wild, scoop out dead leaves, and give your filter a once-over to make sure it's ready for cooler weather. These small efforts now will pay off big when the leaves start falling.

If you find yourself feeling a little uninspired, remember—you're not alone! Most koi keepers feel this way at the tail end of summer. One of the best cures is to connect with fellow hobbyists. Visiting another member's pond or taking part in a late-summer club event can give you new ideas and remind you why we all love this hobby so much.

So, if you find yourself staring at your pond and feeling less inspired, know that it's normal. Every koi and pond keeper goes through the end-of-summer slowdown. Take it as a chance to breathe, tidy up, and enjoy the quiet before fall brings us back into the swing of things with a fresh wave of chores.

# The Importance of Feeding During Winter

There are many myths about Koi Nutrition, so here are some scientific facts behind K.O.I.'s feeding recommendations. Let's look at the myth that Koi should not be fed when water temperatures are below 50 degrees F.

Koi have evolved over millions of years to need a period of fasting, and even the top Japanese breeders who want to maximize growth are fasting their Koi for at least a month over the winter. The duration of the fast varies, depending on whom you talk with, but all seem to agree that 1 to 3 months is ideal.

Remember that Koi are Poikilothermic (or cold-blooded), which means that their body temperature is completely controlled by their environment. So their metabolism is slower when the water is cold and faster when the water is warmer.

Koi also live in an oxygen-poor environment. Air holds 21% oxygen, while water holds only 0.0009% at 70 degrees F. Koi have no stomach (just a long gut). These facts influence their ability to digest food. And finally, Koi need more protein in their diet than most mammals. Humans require 10-15 percent protein, dogs require 15-27%, cats require 30%, Catfish require 32%, but Carp require 35%! (R. Strange, 2006).

In one study, Koi were offered a variety of protein feeds at different water temperatures, and they never selected low-protein food, even in the coldest water. Koi have evolved to prefer high-protein food at all water temperatures.

Koi food produced from plant sources contains some protein, but not enough of the essential amino acids required by Koi. Plant-based foods such as wheat germ should not be included in the Koi diet, ever. Fish meal – specifically from high-quality Capelin, Anchovy, Herring, and Menhaden should be the first ingredient of Koi food. Fish Meal is different from White Fish Meal, which is a byproduct, and has a higher ash content and lower protein content, making it less digestible by Carp. White Fish Meal also increases the waste in the pond.

Based on the above scientific evidence, K.O.I. recommends that Koi be fed the same high-protein feed year-round, and only the quantity should be changed depending on water temperature. Koi food does not rot in the Koi's gut at low water temperatures – Koi will simply not eat what they can't digest, but uneaten food will foul the water unless quickly removed.

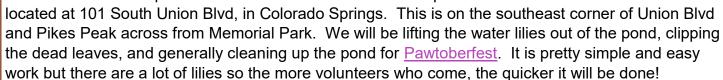
Thus it is ideal to offer our Koi one or two (really – one or two!) pellets each, if and only if they are swimming near the surface, and are actively looking to feed, when water temperatures are below 50 degrees. Feeding in cold water should only be done in extremely low quantities (one to two pellets each, remember?), and never more often than once a week. This does not disturb their fast, but will substantially improve their health as they are coming out of winter, and has been shown to help them start eating earlier in the spring.

# **Highlighted Plant of the Month**



### Zephyr Lily

Zephyranthes candida Tropical Marginal

White blooms in summer to fall in full sun to partial shade. Spreads 6-12" with a height of 6-12". Delicate white lily-like blooms atop grassy leaves. Blooms after rain.

Allow to dry slightly between watering.

Attracts bees and is best kept at a water depth of moist soil or shallow (0-2")

I am always a sucker for the Showa.

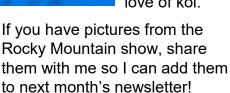
